PLANS ANNOUNCED FOR BRUCE McLaren film

Plans have been announced for the filming of a Bruce McLaren feature in New Zealand. During the A1 Grand Prix event running at the Taupo circuit this weekend, McLaren's widow and daughter announced the plans flanked by government minister Jim Anderton and Emerson Fittipaldi, Sir Jack Brabham and some former McLaren Racing directors.

The film will be produced by the same man who produced the Lord of the Rings films. The script is currently being completed and casting has yet to be decided. The film premiere is being pencilled in for early 2009 and it has apparently received the blessing of Bernie Ecclestone.

The film makers have escaped paying through the nose for footage as all the film to be used is from before 1980 - before the FOM imposed its current rules. New Zealand studios are set to be used for production and special effects and filming is expected to commence by the end of the year.

The two proposals are as follows:

- Combine the language of Article II number 6 into Article II number 1 of the MGCC by-laws for clarification and continuity. Article II number 1 will be written as follows if voted and approved by the membership: The elected Officers of this Club shall consist of: Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Activities Director, and two Trustees, one to be elected by a majority of the membership at the annual election. A second Trustee shall be the immediate past Chairman of the Club. If the immediate past Chairman declines the position, the second Trustee position will be elected by a majority of the membership at the annual election. The balloting shall be secret.
- Rewrite the wording for the duties of vice-chairman. The wording will be as follows if approved by the membership: It shall be the duty of the vice-chairman to perform all the duties of the chairman in his absence and to be a liaison between the board and committee chairpersons.

Leon also stated that a new member from Belgium, that joined the MGCC using the website, wanted to be a member for a year in order to get a car club badge. Due to financial considerations a motion was made and seconded, to make him a member for a year, send him a MGCC badge, and as he already received the January issue of SPOKES (calendar) he should now view subsequent issues on the web. The motion was passed by unanimous vote of the membership present. A suggestion was also made to ask him to write an article on being an MG enthusiast.

Motion to Revise the Bylaws

Article IX, Amendments, Revisions, and Alterations, section 1 in regards to changes in the MGCC bylaws states that any proposed revisions be read at two consecutive meetings and a copy sent to each member at least seven days before a vote is taken on the proposed revisions. The following is being published in the Spokes to fulfill the required copy being sent to each member. The revisions below were read at the January 18, 2007 meeting. They will be read at the February 15, 2007 meeting. There will be a vote at the March 15, 2007 meeting.

There are currently two active proposals approved by and recommended by the MGCC Board to revise the bylaws of the MG Car Club Western New York Centre.

The first proposal is to move/merge the language of Article II, section 6 into Article II, section 1. The purpose of this change is for clarification and continuity.

Currently Article II, section 1 reads:

The elected Officers of this Club shall consist of Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, and Activities Director, and one Trustee, each to be elected by a majority of the membership annually. The balloting shall be secret.

Currently Article II, section 6 reads:

A second Trustee shall be the immediate past Chairman of the Club. If the immediate past Chairman declines the position, the second Trustee position will be elected by a majority of the membership. The balloting shall be secret.

After combining them there will be NO Article II, section 6.

After combining them Article II, section 1 would read:

The elected Officers of this Club shall consist of: Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Activities Director, and two Trustees, one to be elected by a majority of the membership at the annual election. The second Trustee shall be the immediate past Chairman of the Club. In the case of the immediate past Chairman declining the position, the second Trustee position will be elected by a majority of the membership at the annual election. The balloting shall be secret.

The second proposal is to change Article II, section 2 regarding the duties of the Vice-Chairman.

Currently Article II, section 2 reads:

It shall be the duty of the Vice-Chairman to perform all the duties of the Chairman in his absence, and be the head of all committees.

With the proposed change Article II, section 2 would read:

It shall be the duty of the Vice-Chairman to perform all the duties of the Chairman in his absence, and be the to be a liaison between the board and committee chairpersons.

The MG Car Club Honors All Race Car Drivers, Past, Present, and Future 1958–2006

Last January Gayle and Brooks asked me if I had any ideas for centerpieces for the 2006 Christmas party. At first I said no – then later called them and said yes I had an idea. Going through my MG jewelry box I ran across a pair of earrings I bought at the Indianapolis International Race Track Museum. They had the seven flags that are used at all sports car races. I showed them the earrings, told them my idea, "go for it" they said. I said I'd make the centerpieces, when I looked at the work ahead I said to myself –oh my! I thought seven flags each plus 19 sets of flags—you do the math—that's 133 flags. I thought I could just cut out flags, glue them on sticks, and be done. Wrong! They looked terrible. I had to hem all the flags – Yikes!

Next came the blocks to mount the flags. I priced wooden blocks that I'd have to finish, they were \$29.99 apiece! That's why I chose Styrofoam blocks. Next was the brass plaques to mount on the blocks. They were going to cost an arm and a leg. So I called George Herschell and he said he'd do them on his computer. Thanks, George, for saving the Club big bucks! So what you see here is what I came up with.

We're honoring race car drivers, past, present and future. We've been in the club since the beginning and knew all the race car drivers in our club. I came up with most of the drivers and Gil remembered the cars they drove. Back in the 50's & 60's there were quite a few drivers, 17 in all. Three of the racers back then are members here today in our club, Dave Asmuth, Mike Harrison, & Dave Wild! Here are the 17 Past race car drivers:

- 17 Doug Scribner VW & Mini (Doug wasn't a member of the club then but was a very active racer, so I made a set of flags for him.)



Some raced with SCCA a few years before joining the MG Car Club and some continued to race a few years after our Club Races. Ours were all MG races held at Watkins Glen in 1959 & 1960. Automobile Electrical Theory or A Treatise on the Importance of Smoke Joseph Lucas





Bury Me In An Old Mowog Parts Box Jay Lockrow _____



There has probably been more written about the MG TC than any other sports car. Pick up most any book on Sports Cars and more than likely the MG TC will be one of the first included if not the first. With the TCs reputation of being the Sports Car that America Loved First, the car that started the whole sports car movement, or any of a number of these titles, it is pretty much expected to be within the pages of such a volume. There have probably been an equal number of myths about the same car for example, MG stands for Morgan Garages. They look like a casket riding on four harps, leaky, hard riding bad handling and so forth. Who knows how many others. Mostly these are pure rubbish as so many writers are ill informed but want to lead you to believe they are knowledgeable. Even yours truly has made a few errors over the years but at least I will admit it and have tried to correct myself. Certainly I am not an automotive engineer or pretend to be one for I know better. I am, however always interested in any improvement that can be made to the car that will make it more reliable or safer. One of the beauties of the MG TC is its basic simplicity. A person with limited knowledge of auto mechanics can keep a TC operable with very little effort and few tools. By reading the numerous manuals and publications written about the vehicle the process of this endeavor is really quite straight forward. Keep things well lubricated, adjusted

There are those however that do re-engineer and make these improvements so that we owners of the MG TC can keep these old chargers running and safe. In this realm I would like to mention a good friend of mine Bob Grunau that lives over the border in Mississauga, Ontario. Bob has several TCs as well as two or three TAs, a J2 and a PA. He is also looking at another pre war car but I won't mention what it is here. Bob is my age and a retired engineer from Ontario Hydro. Already you can understand that he is knowledgeable about things mechanical. Bob has owned a whole batch of cars like an Elva, Jaguar etc. Of late he has decided to concentrate on the TC and its predecessors. All the better for us because he is the sort of character we need to keep these old buckets on the road and he is a character. Recently I made a trip to his home in Mississauga to pick up a better engineered replacement part for Cecil. After knocking on the door you heard a "That you damn

and petrol in the tank and away you go.

Yankees?" We had originally made plans to go before Christmas but had to scrub the mission because we had some lousy weather. When I called Bob to say we had to scrub he said that means his wife won't be getting a Christmas present. I asked him about this when we did arrive and he confided that she was taken care of.

On they way back from this sojourn (We also went up to Barrie to pick up a Douglas motorcycle frame and engine) it dawned on me that this was the third such item I had purchased from Bob to update Cecil and keep him reliable and easy to maintain. The first of these items was a modern spin oil filter adapter that bolts right in. One bolt and two oil lines and you are in business. The real beauty is that you cannot even notice the difference between this and the old one unless your\ really look. Modern spin on filters are also several bucks cheaper and available at NAPA or wherever you go. Several years back I also purchased a reproduction of the famous Tompkins steering kit that he makes. Beautifully made it also is installed with three bolts and a new adjustment and you are on your way.

Yours truly has been accused several times as being the MG TC guru in the area but I can't begin to compete with someone like Bob. I have seen him quote a thread size from most anywhere on the TC be it BSF, whitworth, metric or SAE licence plate bolts as well as the proper adjustment of some item as well as what little idiosyncrasies to look for if your TC is acting strange. A truly fascinating gentleman with a great sense of humor and tons of great stories to boot.

Bob also makes several other re-engineered pieces for the TC that require a little more fitting. But enough of that lets look at his cars. Upon arriving at his house you can tell you are there because the family grinders are sitting outside. Open the garage and there are TCs in almost every state. Several done to a very high quality and some in stages. I particularly liked the PA he was working on. You seldom see pre war MGs unless you go to a VSCCA meet or a GOF. 
