
stopped since in the car. (Now watch me get a summons this summer.)

Abingdon Alphabet part 16

In our last episode we were talking about the TD and how it had been brought into production as the TC was showing its age. When the TD was introduced it brought about a vast upswing in MG production, but as time went by the TD started to show signs of its age. This is typical of the automobile industry, of course, and is still with us, and will not leave us until the ultimate car is designed and delivered. As the TD had been in production new things had been happening in the sportscar market, and the outstanding innovation was the aerodynamic lines of the slippery sportscar was not new. I recall streamlined sportscars from Malshiem by Bugatti, racing many years before World War Two, at Le Mans. But the production line air flowed sportscar was new. There were a number of them and some were really winners, including the Jaguar XK 120 introduced, I seem to recall, in 1951, and the Triumph TR2 later, with the Austin Healey. This was the trend, and with the improved lines, performance increased. too. When a car does not have to push a built-in headwind through the air in the shape of a flat radiator and a large flat windshield, then the top speed increases rapidly. Now, the boys at Abingdon were fully aware of all this. They had built some very fast record breakers that were very well streamlined and, in 1951, they were able to complete a fine exercise. They were approached by a George Phillips to build an MG that would compete at Le Mans. The car was built upon the underpinning of the TD but had a beautiful smooth body. There were only two real protrudances, the bump in the top of the bonnet where the XPAG engine was apparent and the other was the driver. With the driver sitting on top of the chassis frame it was impossible to get him low enough. However, the car, with the registration UMG 400, showed the way. The car ran well for three hours and then retired with engine troubles. What they were I have never found out, but we do know the car was fast. Now, the obvious question is why didn't the company go into production with this car? I do not know. I have read a number of reason but suspect that as long as the TD sold they allowed it to do so. But, finally, the sales slowed and it was obvious that something had to be done and the result was the TF.



The TF was not a new car. It was a "face lift" and that is about all. The bonnet was lowered and the radiator was allowed to lean back. The radiator cap became an ornament. The headlights were faired into the fenders (wings) and the tail with the tank was raked to match the front of the car. Bucket seats replaced the common seat back of the TD and the instrument panel was changed and we were back with octagonal instruments again. New hubs were fitted and these allowed the fitting of wire wheels that had been so missed with the TD. The engine was raised to the slightly tuned version that appeared in the TD Mark 2. Now adays the TF is very popular with MG enthusiasts but its introduction was not met with enthusiasm. It was felt by most people that MG owners deserved something better. The car was almost identical in performance with the model that preceded it and, of course, the TF was passed by almost every sportscar on the road. One final effort was made to keep the car for a further year and this was the introduction of the TF1500. This car was the same in all respects as the original TF with the exception of the engine. The XPAG unit came to an end and the XPEG was introduced. One of the disadvantage of the XPAG engine was that it could not be bored out very much. Them too, there was not that much room between the bore centers and so the only solution was to move the bore centers and open them out as far as they would go. This resulted in bores that were siamised, that is, there was no water space between the first and second pair of cylinders. The two bores touched. The result was that the bores could be increased to 72 mm from the 66.5 mm of the XPAG. This gave a capacity of 1466 cc. What was that I heard? That it is not 1500 cc? That is right, but it was the closest that the block would allow and so the company used a little poetic license and called the car the TF 1500. For those who are interested, it is possible to bore the XPAG to get 1340 cc, but you might strike water doing it! The

TF 1500 did offer a little increase in performance over the TF and TD, but it was small and so the handwriting was clearly on the wall and the days of the "square rigged" MG's were numbered. The numbers of the TF built from late 1953 until early 1955 were 6200 TF's and 3400 TF 1500's. The TF was introduced at the Motor Show in late 1953 and, as I have recorded, it was not met with the greatest of enthusiasm. At the same show another MG was announced and it was also looked upon sideways by the faithful. It was the MG Magnette ZA. Now there were a number of things that MG nuts did not like about the car. In the first place there was much complaint about the choice of the almost holy name of "Magnette" applied to a saloon. They had forgotten that the name that was heralded around the race tracks of the world was first carried by a saloon (sedan), the K1, and that was not the fastest car on the road either. Then there was the fact that the car was not a true MG. It was originally a Wolseley 4-44, and now it appeared with an MG grille. That did not sit well, as you can imagine.



However, it had some good features. It had a sturdy BMC 'B' engine, with 1489 cc and twin SU's. You will immediately see the conflict when the TF was still getting by with the 1250 cc XPAG engine and the ZA had a bigger displacement engine that the TF so badly needed. The engine produced 60 hp and once again you will see the problem, when compared with the TF. The car sat upon a 102" wheelbase, and the track was 51". It had a sturdy four speed transmission and the only body style available was the four door saloon. The lines were very pleasant and the car soon found many happy buyers, it fact, it was soon very embarassing to the company when the ZA was handily outselling the TF! The car had very good handling for a four-door and a tidy turn of speed. One thing that I recall was very much missed and a source of criticism was the lack of a tachometer, on an MG, no less!


In 1956 the ZB was introduced and this was even better than the ZA. The SU's were larger and there were detailed differences. The car was better and more popular. Later in 1958 the "Varitone" model was offered which was a two tone paint job affair that I personally never liked. This car became a great favorite and has continued to this day with those who know the car with more than just a passing acquaintance. The ZA was unique amongst MG's as it was the first MG to be built with unit construction, that is, it had no separate chassis. The front suspension was typical of the independent type that had appeared upon the Y series and followed through the late T series. The other change was really the introduction of BMC units in the engine and transmission. The engine, as I have said, was sturdy and was found acceptable to tuning (more on that later), but it was designed in Longbridge and had been used in Austins before. To am MG enthusiast, at that time, that was a fate worse than death. Also, you will have noted we have now reached the end of the alphabet and, although you al know what transpired next, in those years it was a great matter of speculation amongst us all as to what the factory would do. The ZB came to an end in late 1958, after 12,754 ZA's and 23,846 ZB's had been built. There were Magnette Mk 3 and Mk 4 offered and sold, but I would just as soon ignore them. They were "badge engineered" from Longbridge and were Austins under false colors (what could be worse?). All I will say is that the Mark 4 was better than the 3, and that should not be construed as a compliment.

Sunday July 21 The Sports Car Festival Elks Club 1066 Jackson Road, Webster

This show is the MG Car Club's continuation of the long running (40 years or 39 years, depending on whose doing the counting) Sports Car and Vintage Auto Festival. The MG Board (Board) decided to change the name to "The Sports Car Festival" to emphasize the Sports Car. Wikipedia defines a Sports Car as a small, usually two seat automobile designed for spirited performance and nimble handling.
