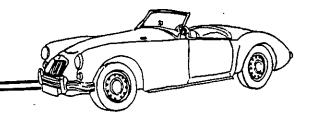

I'D RATHER SWITCH THAN FIGHT

OR IT'S EASY TO CONVERT YOUR MG FROM TWO 6 VOLT TO ONE 12 VOLT POWER.

We've all been there at one time or another. You hop into the MG ready to fly off, top down on a beautiful day and you turn the key only to hear "click, click, click" or maybe "arrruah click, click, click" or maybe even " ----- ". My '73 MGB had a funny trait of not starting three out of ten tries. Hit the key a few times and she would usually start. I tried all the usual routes cleaned the battery posts, bought new clamps and connectors, sanded down and re-tightened the ground and hot leads to the starter and alternator check. But the problem persisted. Finally I noticed excessive leaking of battery acid from around the posts on both of my '73 original Lucas "heavy duty" 6-volts. So I needed new batteries. They just wouldn't hold a charge and, my gosh, 12 years on Lucas batteries is enough, isn't it! Checking with local parts suppliers and with our club's battery expert (Dick Powers) the best price on two 6-volts was about \$34 each. The trouble is I was fed up with having two batteries to have to worry about, twice the chances for a dead cell or leaking battery. When I had my '71 MGB one of the battery boxes rusted through and I lost a battery, which pulled out the cross over cable between the batteries and yanked the second battery half out.

With our '73 B once Peggi couldn't get it to turn over at work and had to have a jump start. She knew how to get to the batteries but not how to hook up the jumper cables - DANGEROUS! No thanks. One 12-volt for me. So I settled down and decided to check out how difficult conversion would be. Let me tell you, it was easier than I thought it would be, much easier! And it's less expensive too. One 12-volt from out club battery man (Interstate 48-month warranteed) was \$42 compared to the \$68 needed to replace the two 6-volts. The only tools needed are: ½" open end wrench, ½" socket, 7/16" socket, sandpaper and maybe a file. Group 21 12-volt battery (I chose Interstate) fits MGA, MGC, MGB(to '74 ½).

Remove both 6-volts from the car. Using a battery carrying strap is really helpful. I also had just replaced my terminal connectors, but this is a good time to replace them if they are weak, old or corroded. Replace only the terminal on the positive line in the passenger side box (to the starter) and the terminal on the ground cable that bolts to the box in the driver's side. Using the ½" open end wrench and ½" socket, remove the nut and bolt holding the ground strap onto the driver's side battery box.

Jack up the car to gain sufficient working clearance (always use jackstands when you're under the car) and using the 7/16" socket and a long extension, remove the bolt securing the crossover cable hold down clamp. It's located directly above the rear U-joint of the drive shaft in the hump. Pull the ends out of each battery box and withdraw the crossover cable from underneath the car. Let down the car from the jack, and look in the passenger's side battery box. Notice the pre-drilled hole in the back top of the box in the exact position as the ground cable bolt hole in the driver's side box.

This will be the new ground location. Using the sandpaper or a file, scrape away the paint 1 all around this hole to provide a good ground for the battery. Now, attach the ground cable you removed from the driver's side box to the passenger's side box using the %" nut and bolt through the hole. Be sure your ground cable is in good shape with no cracks, frayed ends or splits. Tighten the nut and bolt securely to provide secure ground. Now, lower the new 12-volt battery carefully into the passenger's side Be sure to position the two posts toward the front of the This brings the positive terminal closest to the positive Tighten both terminal clamps. Attach hold downs (if any mine doesn't have any). There might not be room for any hold down devices with the tight fit of the new 12-volt, but it's not going anywhere! Replace the battery cover, carpet and go get a beer - you're done.

I've had no more problems with by B starting since this conversion and all lights, radio & instruments function fine. Now, about those leaking tire tubes ... how can I replace them with something more reliable and still keep my wire wheels?

Bob Tescione volunteered to chair an on-going committee to field constructive criticism and suggestions for improving the car show. It was moved and seconded that this committee be formed.

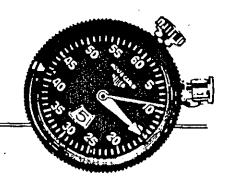
George Herschell announded that we have, as of tonight, 84 family memberships!

Classic Race

This is a story about a group of five and a car, a 1934 V-12 Packard with six cylinders on each side.

The car is so authentic you expect the Godfather to get out with a satchel. It's black, and it's big, with the distinctively Packard fenders, the Mercury hood ornament, the magnificent front bumper. There's enough room to hold a bridge party in the back

The group is made up of Avery Hall, Doris Bailey, Joseph F. Kaelin, George Little and Linda Welch, A disparate collection of people with one thing in common: the Packard they're going to race.

Race a 1934 Packard? Would you believe, across the country? The race, called The Great American Race, starts June 24 in Los Angeles and winds up July 4 in New York City.

With its \$250,000 purse, the course attracts the wealthy and the adventurous, each paying a \$5,000 entry fee in quest of the \$100,000 first prize.

"The chance of a lifetime." says Bailey, a longtime sports car enthusiast and vocalist who has owned a 1946 MGTC and various BMWs. Her husband, Everett Bailey, has been a bemused bystander. "Everett thinks we're all patently mad, but he says, T do understand.

"The whole idea of this is to put old cars back on the road as opposed to being put on static display," explains Hall, 53, classic car enthusiast since 1954, "This way, hundreds of thousands of people will see these cars. They'll be on parade in 30 cities, including Chicago."

It's not a race as such. It's a time, speed, distance rally, meaning that the objective is for the cars to come as close as possible? to a theoretical speed or time

over a given distance.

Each vehicle has a driver and at least one navigator. As the cars leave at one-minute intervals, they are handed detailed directions for the day's charted course a speedometer and a stop watch, ecstatic. "So majestic!" they have to figure out the course.

pit crews that are sent ahead of the pack. The crews don't exactly have a Sunday drive either. They travel all day long in the support vehicles and then spend much of the nights in motel parking lots, working on the engine or other problem parts.

The intricate rules and the temperament of the ancient vehicles on a long grueling road trip make rallying a test of nerves. Participants can become weary and testy. "Like, turn left at the next silo, all the way across the United States," says Bailey, "We could be crazy by the second

Last year, 86 cars started and 65 finished. The race was held in

"Running so late in the year, the weather could be hot all the way to New York, Imagine Kansas on a summer day, Pennsylva-nia when it's muggy," Bailey adds cheerfully. "It could be a horror

"If we boil, we've had it," says Hall, his mind on the engine.

"I hope the hotels have swimming pools," says Bailey, going him one further.

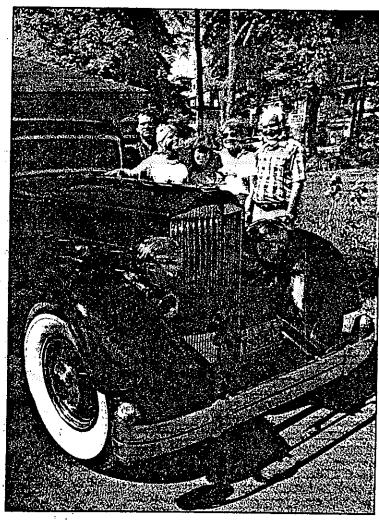
The five have been planning on the Great American Race for a year. The Packard 12, which had not been operated since 1975, belongs to Kaelin, 45, of Shelburne, a professional classic car mechanic and driver. George Little, 35, who owns Tamarack Garage, had the major task of rebuilding the engine. The job took months. The 17-inch tires only arrived two weeks ago.

"All the way through, the thread of difficulty was obtaining parts, re-building the brakes, modifying an exhaust pipe, the charging system," Bailey says. "George did a first class job."

Last week, they drove the Packard to Montpelier where Gov. Madeleine Kunin gave them a Vermont state flag. You should have seen it coming up French and prescribed speeds. With only Hill. The back-up crew was

The big day is getting closer. Most vehicles have so-called. Kaelin and Linda Welch leave today with the car in a 1976 Dodge van. Hall, Little and Bailey will fly to Los Angeles on June 22.

Taking a long drive with Bailey has another dimension. She's one of the few professional singers who hums, sings, across the miles, though she professes that on a serious race like this one, she'll be too busy concentrating on the navigation.

The hairy business of getting the Packard ready, however, has bounced the crew from one crisis to another. At one point while rebuilding the engine they sent the connecting rods for the 12 cylinders to Paul's Rod in Missouri. When the box arrived in Burlington, there were only nine. "And they're priceless," she said, when telling this story. "The UPS man went dashing back to the depot, and there they were, lying on the platform. Irreplaceable. Undamaged."

She should have been telling these things to a tape recorder so she could play it back after it's all over. Instead, she made up some lyrics to "Sentimental Journey," which she sings in her low blues voice:

Gonna take a sentimental jour-

Gonna drive the Packard D-E. Gonna take a sentimental jour-

To create new memories.

Got our bags, got our reserva-

Spent each dollar we could af-

Like a kid in wild anticipation, Maybe crazy, never bored.

Seven? Avery, George and I leave at seven.

We'll be waiting up for Linda and Joe - in the van,

All in LA, won't it be grand.

Never knew our hearts could be so yearn-y,

In the great race, we'll rally and roam.

Gonna take a sentimental journey,

Oh, black Packard, take us home! "You gotta have some fun out of this thing," she says.

If the judges have any sense, they'll have her sing it for the crowd which welcomes them to New York. That'll wow them
